

Public Information related to Higher Education Emergency Relief Funding (HEERF) for the quarter ending on December 31st, 2021.

1. TRCOA has signed and returned to the Department the Certification and Agreement and has used/will use the applicable amount of funds designated under the CRRSAA and ARP (a)(1) and (a)(4) programs to provide Emergency Financial Aid Grants to Students within the timeframes designated by the Department.
2. As of 12/31/2021, the total amount of funds that the institution has received from the Department pursuant to the institution's Certification and Agreement for Emergency Financial Aid Grants to Students under the CRRSAA and ARP (a)(1) and (a)(4) programs is \$33,404.
3. As of 12/31/2021, the total amount of Emergency Financial Aid Grants distributed to students under the CRRSAA and ARP (a)(1) and (a)(4) programs is \$33,404.
4. As of 12/31/2021 the estimated total number of students at TRCOA that are eligible to receive Emergency Financial Aid Grants to Students under the CRRSAA and ARP (a)(1) and (a)(4) programs is 19.
5. As of 12/31/2021 the total number of students at TRCOA who have received an Emergency Financial Aid Grant to students under the CRRSAA and ARP (a)(1) and (a)(4) programs is 31.
6. For the \$13,150 in Emergency Financial Aid Grants distributed in this quarter, a priority was given to those students who were in greater financial need. Grants were distributed proportionately based upon individual need while referring to students' EFCs and Pell distribution amounts. The other criteria for determining which students were eligible included the following two main factors... 1) The student must be in good academic standing. 2) The student must have successfully completed more than 10%, but not more than 85% of their overall program hours to be considered for grant funding.
7. These disbursements were made in compliance with regulations related to the CRRSAA and ARP (a)(1) and (a)(4) programs.
8. TRCOA informs students the Emergency Financial Aid Grant funds may be used for any component of the student's cost of attendance or for emergency costs that arise due to coronavirus, such as tuition, food, housing, health care (including mental health care), or child care. Funds are distributed via check written to the student (or parent depending on the student's dependent/independent status).
